

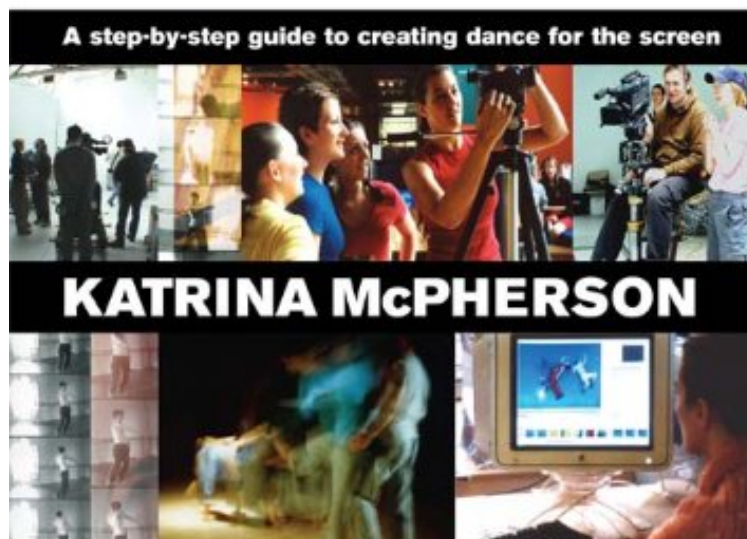

This is the first ever how-to manual for choreographers, dancers and students who want to make dance films.
